# Union County Public Schools Medication Administration

## Medication Consent Form Requirements

- Student's name
- Name of Medication
- Medical Diagnosis
- Dose to be given
- Route of medication (by mouth, eyes/ear or inhaled)
- Time the medication should be given
- How the medication is dispensed

#### Medication Consent Form Requirements

- Purpose of medication
- Parent signature and date
- Parent contact information
- Doctor (MD/DO), Physician Assistant (PA), or Nurse Practitioner (NP) signature and contact information
- How often as needed (PRN) medication can be given
- Symptoms for as needed (PRN) medications to be given
- CHECK WITH NURSE FOR QUESTIONS ABOUT MEDICATION CONSENTS




#### **Medications Received**



- All medication received in a prescription bottle must have:
  - Student's name
  - Correct name of medication
  - Strength of the medication
    - Regardless of instructions on prescription bottle, all medication administration must follow the medication consent form
- Over the counter medications:
  - Must be in original bottle/dispensing by manufacturer
- Any medications received that are not in a correctly labeled prescription bottle or in original dispensing by manufacturer will not be given

# **EXPIRED** MEDICATIONS CANNOT BE ACCEPTED OR GIVEN



Follow this chart for a quick guide when receiving medications

### Administering Medications

- Ensure the 5 Rights of Medication Administration
  - Right Student
  - Right Medication(s)
  - Right Amount/Dose
  - Right Route (ex: by mouth)
  - Right Time



■ Medication must be given within 30 minutes before or after the prescribed time. Medication that is due at 10:00 am may be given between 9:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

#### Documenting Medication Administration

- ALL medication given must be charted in the medication log
- There are two types of medication logs
  - Daily/scheduled medications
  - As needed (PRN) medications or emergency medications
- When giving daily or as needed medications, proper documentation includes:
  - Date, time, initials
  - mg for all medications
  - Amount of "puffs" given for inhaled medications

#### Documentation

(on the bottom of the medication log)

- Be sure to include date and your initials on each entry
- Don't forget to send "medication needed" reminder home when student's supply is low
- Count and document all controlled substances
- Any phone/note communication home to parent
- Any communication with school nurse/doctor




If a medication is not documented as given, staff will assume the medication was NOT given

#### DON'T FORGET TO

All daily medications <u>must</u> be given. You may have to go and find the student if they do not come to the office.



#### Questions About Medication Administration?

- When in doubt, do NOT give the medication
- Questions that may arise
  - Should I give this?
  - Is this the correct dose?
  - The student states he/she has already taken this medication today?
  - The student questions the amount or color of liquid?
  - The student questions the color of the pill?
  - The student questions the time of the medication?
- If there are <u>any</u> questions, call the school nurse for clarification

# Quick Tips & Helpful Hints

- When in doubt, call for the school nurse
- If medication does not follow the guidelines, the parent will have to come and administer medication if needed at school until the proper forms and bottles are received
- Make sure you witness child taking medication
  - The child can not leave to take medication in another room
- If you make an error while documenting medication, draw a single line through the mistake and record correct information

## Field Trips

- All medications given at school or school sponsored field trips must have parental and medical provider consent
- Consents are required for all medications including emergency, prescription and over-the counter.
- All medication must be sign-out prior to the field trip and signed back in immediately to the health room.
- Stock medications are not allowed to be taken on a field trip.
