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A Message from the 2018 Western Region Teacher of the Year, Julie Pittman





When I was growing up, I thought of my mother as Wonder-Woman. She is a life-long educator - who taught me that no person and no obstacle could hold me back - EVER. I thank my mom for my resilience in the classroom and in life.

I was the student that on some days was fortunate enough to be alive and sitting at my desk. I was present but not present. I was also the student whose mom saved us and who pushed us towards a better life. Along the way, there were a few special teachers God put in front of me. These teachers pulled me to the other side allowing me to triumph over many obstacles.

Today, I am struck by the honor of this magnitude because I am a teacher. Being a teacher isn't just a role that we take to stand in front of a classroom and instruct students about the curriculum we've mastered. Being a teacher isn't JUST about hall duty, PTA, field trips, IEPs or SSMTs. Teaching is ALSO about building leaders and giving them the opportunity to LEAD. It is about helping others find their passion and giving them the COURAGE to pursue it. It is about seeing the impossible and finding a way to transcend it. Teaching is about seeing a child as someone who will change the world, and setting him/her on the path to do it.

Our students have become the leaders, forging their own paths with their voices and passions about changing the way things have always been. How awesome it must be to be a student right now and see the world as one to mold. What a great honor it is to be a teacher today and know that WE can help those students down those paths. We can WORK together as a TEAM to make dreams happen. He said that he grew up with peers calling him stupid, and teachers calling his mom about his behavior at school. He was ready to give up, but one of his teachers would not let him. She found a mentor who tirelessly worked with him to complete his project and graduate from high school. She believed he could finish what he started, and she would not give up on him until he believed it too. At the end of his presentation, that student said he knew that he wouldn't go to college as a student athlete, but that after finishing his project he knew he would go to college as a STUDENT. And then he said: "I may not have learned a lot about my actual subject here, but what I did learn from my project is that every single kid deserves to have an adult believe in him. My teacher and mentor were the team who believed in me."

I think about this story every single day and about how lucky kids are to have teachers who are heroes - real superheroes.

Teaching is my superpower. I have the power to teach, the power to love, the power to see, the power to give my voice and the power to show others that their voices matter. So, I urge you to use your powers. We are teachers and teaching is our **SUPERPOWER!**

Troops to Teachers (TTT) is a military career transition program that helps eligible members of the armed forces begin new careers as K-12 public school teachers. This program also is a resource to armed forces members once they become new teachers. BTs that meet certain time in service, registration window criteria, and are teaching in a "high need" school could receive up to \$10,000 in incentives. These teachers must register in their first year of teaching. Additionally, there is military experience credit available (since 2013) through the Corporal Pruitt Rainey Brass to Class Act.
